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A: Overall feedback

Thanks for sharing your essay with me! I can see that you've put a lot of thought into the 'If I were...' framework to show the reader sides of yourself. I especially enjoyed the reference to Coco. While reading your Coco paragraph, I was able to get a glimpse into your life, which seems to really resemble the movie.

You offer several different 'If I were..' examples to give the reader insight into you, but I'm not sure if the examples you are using and the values associated with these are clear... yet. I have some suggestions you may find useful in clarifying your paragraphs and emphasizing your values. I'll also suggest a slight reordering of your paragraphs that may help them flow better.

B: Feedback on content/topic

With this essay, it looks like you're taking the "Montage" approach—that is, writing about a series of seemingly unrelated events or moments that, put together, combine to create a coherent, connected story.

At College Essay Guy, when we see a montage, we like to ask the following questions. Does the essay...

1. Make clear what the topic/thematic thread is?
2. Set up specific examples for each paragraph that clearly link to a clear topic/thematic thread?
3. Demonstrate values through those specific examples?
4. Offer possible insights that answer "so what" in regard to the author's experiences and values?

In my view, your values are evident in your paragraph about Coco, Alice in Wonderland, and Rapunzel. I don't see the values as clearly when reading your Blue, Girl on Fire, and Water paragraphs. I'd like for you to try and clarify the values you want to emphasize in these paragraphs. You could potentially help the reader by deciding to either a) show the values through specific examples, or b) state the values explicitly (either approach can work).

For example, in your water paragraph you talk about wanting something and then not wanting something AND feeling something is not enough and then feeling like it is enough. As a result, I'm not quite clear which specific value you're hoping to show the reader using water. Is the point of the paragraph to show that you continuously change your mind? It can be difficult for readers to understand your 'so what' (i.e., insight) moments if they aren't sure what values you're trying to emphasize.

I'll provide links in the 'Next Steps' section that I think you might find useful in revising/refining your paragraphs.

C: Feedback on flow/structure

In terms of you structure, it seems to me your paragraphs are currently set-up like this (I've listed what I think the values are in parentheses):

1. Pixar Animation - (culture, family, music)
2. Alice in Wonderland Book - (curiosity)
3. Color Blue - (friendship)
4. Word Loyal - (Can you expand on what you are loyal to?)
5. Song Girl on Fire - (Maybe drive?)
6. Element Water - (?)
7. Disney Princess Rapunzel - (Curiosity)

What do you think about the following restructure? I grouped together the paragraphs that seemed to be more closely related. Since the first three are stories, it might be nice for the reader to read about them all in a row.

1. Pixar Animation
2. Disney Princess Rapunzel
3. Alice in Wonderland Book
4. Element Water
5. Color Blue
6. Word Loyal
7. Song Girl on Fire

This is only a suggestion for your paragraph order. Once you make clear your values, you might find a different structure to be better.

A final note on tone: I notice you're using sentence fragments as a stylistic choice. This took me a minute to get used to, and while I think it could work for your final draft, you might also consider playing with full sentences. Perhaps try both and see which way you like better.

D. Next steps

1. Clarify the values in each paragraph. You might find it helpful to expand on the similarities you have with each of your 'If I were...' paragraphs as a way to highlight values.

2. Include insight that answers your 'so what' moments in regards to your experiences and values. [This link](#) provides information on what 'so what' moments are and suggestions on how to add insight into personal statements.
3. Consider restructuring your paragraphs based on your 'If I were...' topics. It could be beneficial to order similar topics near each other.
